School councils are the bridge to promote positive engagement in a school community.

The work of school council builds bridges in the school community, and becomes a bridge - connecting parents and community members to the school.

A school council is the gathering forum representing the collective parent voice in the school - ALL of the parents.

School councils are mandated in legislation to advise the principal and the school board on matters relating to the school. Their overarching purpose is to support and enhance student learning.

School councils can be a bridge for the school community to respect diversity, promote inclusion and safe and caring schools, through their activities and initiatives.

A quote that relates to school councils (by lecturer Peter M. DeWitt): "Talking with families is important. You either build a bridge or a wall."

Core Activities

- Advises the principal and school board on education issues that pertain to the school.
- Establishes and reviews school council's goals, objectives, action plans and procedures.
- Communicates and consults with parents and the school community.
- Meets regularly.

Established school councils:

- focus on what is best for all students in the school
- consider the interests of all school stakeholders
- maintain and reflect the culture of the school
- represent the parent voice in the school community
