Raising Funds and Raising Structures: Building & Funding Playgrounds & Parks

Is your group looking to build a playground and park that kids will love? Join experienced playground designer Pat Zelenak and professional fundraiser Kim Street who will share what you need to know about putting up a playground or park in your community.

From forming a playground committee all the way to your grand opening, you will learn how to maximize the play value in your playground and how to stay within budget.

The path to developing new parks can be challenging and require large capital investments. The second half of this session provides an overview of the process to develop a fundraising plan for a new park, understand the process in attempting to secure large amounts of funding, how all stakeholders fit into the equation and how to leverage what you have.

Pat Zelenak has a passion and talent for building playgrounds that kids love. He has been in the industry since 1992 in a variety of roles, from design and sales, to installation. Working extensively with parent and community groups, Pat is an expert helping groups secure funding so they can maximize the play value in their playgrounds.

Kim has been a professional fundraiser since 1992 working with organizations including the Canadian Paraplegic Association, Canadian Cancer Society, Handicapped Housing, Youth Emergency Shelter and Tevie Miller Heritage School. Focusing her interests in writing grants to be successful in her quest for raising funds, Kim has raised over \$1 million (twice) for both Elmwood and St. Martha Schools in redeveloping their playgrounds.

Kim is currently working with more than 30 groups throughout Alberta in an effort to identify and secure funding for various projects including playgrounds, spray decks, arenas, community activities and school improvements.

David Eggen was sworn in as the Minister of Education on May 24, 2015.

In addition to being a member of Cabinet, Mr. Eggen currently serves on the Economic Policy Committee and Social Policy Committee.

Mr. Eggen was elected to his third term as a Member of the Legislative Assembly for Edmonton-Calder on May 5, 2015. He previously served as the critic for energy, education, environment and sustainable resource development.

Mr. Eggen was educated at the University of Alberta, where he received a bachelor of education degree in 1984. He then went to Zimbabwe, where he taught for three years. Upon his return to Edmonton he taught at a number of local schools from 1990 to 2004.

The Eggen family has lived and worked in northwest Edmonton for more than 20 years.

Mickey Wilson has been working in the LGBTQ community for 35 years. His education was in Theology and Sociology and he is an ordained minister, now retired from active ministry.

Involved with organizations including the Interfaith Association on AIDS, Edmonton Pride Festival, OUTreach Southern Alberta, and the Lethbridge Pride Festival, Mickey was the Prairies Regional Director for Egale Canada for six years, Chair of the National Trans* Committee for five years and is the current Executive Director at The Pride Centre of Edmonton.

Kristy Harcourt is an educator and community advocate for violence prevention, community safety and LGBTQ issues. She spent nine years with the *Canadian Red Cross Respect* education program - training and consulting on issues related to bullying and harassment, family violence and teen relationships. Pursuing a Master's degree in Social Work, Kristy is an education developer focused on LGBTQ seniors, homelessness and health issues.

Understanding School Generated Funds

Enhance the conversation at your school council meeting by joining a school Secretary-Treasurer to gain a greater understanding about School Generated Funds (SGF). School councils may wonder exactly what "school generated funds" are.

Questions frequently asked may be: What is the expectation related to accountability and transparency? Is it reasonable for a school council to ask to see how the SGF collected for lunch supervision have been spent? Or field trips? Are funds collected by the school council and given to the school to hold/manage on behalf of the school council considered SGF? What happens to funds left over at the end of the school year? Can the School Board redirect SGFs to another school?

Ryan Stierman has been in school business for eight years and is currently Secretary Treasurer for Elk Island Catholic Schools. He is a Chartered Professional Accountant (CPA), has an MBA in Public Policy and Management, and is a Zone 3 Director for the Association of School Business Officials of Alberta (ASBOA).

Kristen Miller is a member of Na-Cho Nyak Dun First Nation located in the Yukon Territory. She was a Kindergarten Head Start teacher in the inner city of Edmonton for nine years and then employed with the Ministry of Human Services for fifteen years where she had opportunity to connect with a variety of First Nation and Métis communities throughout Alberta. She attained teachings from elders and further developed a deeper understanding of cultural traditions, protocols and the healing power of ceremony.

Kristen currently works as a Consultant with the First Nation, Métis and Inuit Education Unit with the Edmonton Public School Board.

Athena McKenzie is a member of the Métis Nation of Alberta, connected to the Lac St Anne Métis where her ancestors and relatives have lived for years. Raised with a strong sense of her Métis identity, Athena has worked for the Metis Nation of Alberta researching the Michif language, as well as director and program coordinator for the Métis Settlements General Council. Employed as a First Nations, Métis and Inuit Liaison in two school districts north of Edmonton enhanced her practice to build stronger relationships with families of First Nations, Métis and Inuit students.

Athena currently works as a Consultant with the First Nations, Métis and Inuit Education Unit with the Edmonton Public School Board.

Her education includes a BA, BEd, and MEd.

Dave McCann is the Team Leader for Career and Technology Foundations (CTF). Dave's educational experiences span grades 2 to 10, administration, in Canada's Arctic, South America and Africa.

So what is it that parents need to know about screen time? How do parents support their children's online learning? What do we know to be true about the effective ways in which technology can support student learning? Join us in this session as we discuss our obligation to protect our children while ensuring they are engaged in relevant learning that prepares them to be contributing citizens.

Working with Schools to Support Students with Exceptional Needs

Kathryn Burke Centre for Literacy

Special education is one of the most conflict ridden areas of the education system. The sources of conflict are varied, but normally relate to struggles to ensure a child receives the services he or she may need, the way in which those services are provided, and communication among all parties.

Ideally, it is vital for parents, teachers, assistants, school administrators, and the consultants who work in the education system to be united in supporting exceptional learners.

Drawing upon principles of interest-based negotiation, practical and easy to adopt strategies teachers and parents can use to prevent conflict will be presented to maintain effective working relationships and focus on common interests – to do what is best for the student with exceptional learning needs.

Kathryn Burke is the Executive Director of Edmonton's Centre for Literacy, an organization that provides intense remedial support for students with language or math disabilities.

Previously she was the Executive Director of the Learning Disabilities Association of Alberta for five years, and has served as a consultant within the health care sector.

Author of the bestselling book, *An Accidental Advocate*, chronicling her family's journey supporting her son's exceptional needs, Kathryn frequently appears on television and radio, commenting on special education reform and the needs of students. She holds an honors undergraduate and Master's degree in Sociology from the University of Calgary and was a recipient of the ASCA Parent of Distinction Award in 2012 for her work on behalf of students with exceptional needs.

Suicide Prevention is Everybody's Business

Laurie Young Alberta Health Services (AHS)

The Centre for Suicide Prevention in Canada indicates suicide accounts for 24% of all deaths among 15-24 year olds. Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death for young people in Canada. According to the Canadian Mental Health Association, on average, 500 people die by suicide every year.

Information on suicide including common misconceptions, identifying factors associated with suicide risk - such as cyberbullying, identifying factors associated with protection against suicide - such as family and school connectedness, and the warning signs that someone may be in danger of suicide will be presented. Learn strategies to use when you recognize a child or youth is at risk of suicide and where to turn for help in the community.

POWERUP! Facilitating Healthy School Environments Through Policy

Dr. Kim Raine, Dr. Soultana Macridis and Kayla Atkey, MSc School of Public Health, University of Alberta, Alberta Policy Coalition for Chronic Disease Prevention (APCCP)

Do you wonder how school councils can influence healthy policies in their school? POWER UP! stands for *Policy Opportunity Windows – Enhancing Research Uptake in Practice.* POWER UP! is a team of researchers, practitioners, and policy makers who have come together to gather and share evidence on chronic disease prevention with Canadians.

This session will include information on evidence-based tools and resources developed by the POWER UP! project, such as the 2015 Report Card on Healthy Food Environments and Nutrition for Children and Youth, as well as the Policy Readiness Tool (www.policyreadinesstool.com).

Participants will learn how these tools and resources can be used to facilitate healthy public policy in the school setting.

Dr. Kim Raine is a Professor in the Centre for Health Promotion Studies, School of Public Health, University of Alberta in Edmonton. Dr. Raine was Principal Investigator of Healthy Alberta Communities, a project to prevent obesity and chronic diseases, and co-directs the Alberta Policy Coalition for Chronic Disease Prevention (APCCP) that advocates for policy interventions to create supportive environments for healthy living.

Dr. Soultana Macridis is a research associate in the School of Public Health at the University of Alberta. Her doctoral work was in partnership with the *Kahnawake School Diabetes Prevention Project*, located on the Mohawk reserve of Kahnawake where she mobilized and engaged key school and community stakeholders to develop active programming for two local elementary schools.

Kayla Atkey, MSc, is the policy analyst for the APCCP team. Previously, she was a research assistant for the Promoting Optimal Weights through Ecological Research and the Ecosystem and Participatory Approaches to Health labs at the Centre for Health Promotion Studies, University of Alberta.

She has taught Social Studies and Aboriginal Studies as a teacher with Edmonton Public Schools. Previously, Corinne was seconded to Alberta Education to support curriculum and resource development in Social Studies.

In her current role, Corinne is honoured to support the work of the branch in assuring culturally authentic and historically accurate First Nations, Métis and Inuit content and perspectives in curriculum.

Corinne traces her Métis roots to Swampy Cree of Moose Lake, Manitoba, and through the fur trade, her ancestors came to Fort Edmonton.

Janis Irwin loves social studies, and brings to Alberta Education experience as a high school teacher, vice principal, and university lecturer. Janis has a bachelor's and master's degree in education, and is in pursuit of a PhD at the University of Alberta.

Understanding Canadian History Using the Blanket Exercise

Athena McKenzie and Shirley Mykituk Edmonton Public Schools, Edmonton Catholic School Board

Fifteen years ago, the Aboriginal Rights Coalition worked with Indigenous elders and teachers to develop an interactive way of learning the history most Canadians are never taught. The Blanket Exercise was the result; the exercise uses blankets to represent the lands of what is now called Canada, and the distinct cultures and nations which live on those lands to this day.

Students and staff of Edmonton Public and Catholic School Boards will guide you through this thoughtful and moving experience.

As a participant, you will represent the First Peoples; when you move onto the blankets, you will be taken back in time to the arrival of the Europeans. The narrator and a European (or two) work with the participants to read a script while the exercise goes through the history of treaty-making, colonization and resistance, that resulted in the nation that we today, call Canada.

Junior and senior high school students from Edmonton Public Schools and Edmonton Catholic School Board will assist in the demonstration.

Learning Technology Policy Framework

In collaboration with ASCA and other education stakeholders, the Alberta School Boards Association has a lead role in the development of a toolkit to assist school boards to create a revised policy/administrative procedure aligned with the goals of the LTPF.

Participants will receive a brief overview of the work to date and where it stands today, then will be asked to provide direction on elements that parents would like to see addressed in a district policy/administrative procedure.

Brian Callaghan's education career spans 40 years. He has been a teacher, principal and superintendent and is currently in his fourth year as an Education Consultant with the Alberta School Boards Association. From 2013-15 he was a member of the Ministry's School Technology Advisory Committee and held information sessions for trustees throughout the province in this policy area.


