A. Grant Writing Workshop

This workshop offers valuable information about accessing funds through private and public grants and provides insight into the world of grant writing. Samples and tips, timing, criteria, and where to find out about them, as well as working with government and industry, will be shared. Presented by Kim Street, a professional fundraiser from Edmonton. Kim started her fundraising career in 1992 with the Canadian Paraplegic Association, then with the Canadian Cancer Society, Handicapped Housing, Youth Emergency Shelter and the Tevie Miller Heritage School. In 2007, Kim took a step back to be with her eldest son who suffered a severe traumatic brain injury sustained from a fall. Since then, she has spent time working with local organizations including Events Edmonton, and efforts to raise in excess of \$1M for each of *Elmwood* and *St. Martha* elementary schools to support the redevelopment of their playgrounds. The funds raised for the schools also covered classroom iPad sets and art supplies. Kim continues to source funding for organizations including the Stollery Children's Hospital Foundation, Edmonton Ski Club and Edmonton Freestyle Ski Club.

Healthy School Communities

Canmore Room Working with Schools to Support **Special Needs**

For parents of children with special or exceptional learning needs, interacting with teachers, instructional/teaching assistants and principals can be stressful. Relationships that start out positive may deteriorate as parents perceive that the needs of their child are not being addressed. The source of difficulties may also relate to failed communication. In this practical session, participants will learn principles and steps to build constructive and collaborative working relationships with teachers, aides and administrators. The session is suitable for parents of students from pre-school to high school.

Presented by Kathryn Burke, Executive Director of Edmonton's Centre for Literacy, which provides intense remedial support for students with language or math disabilities. A research report was commissioned by the Alberta School Councils' Association as follow-up to the survey on school council effectiveness in Alberta done in 2008.

The findings and recommendations generated provide a framework to inform school council efforts to support *Inspiring Education's* vision for students. The analysis shows many school councils are better positioned than ever to support school and school system efforts to foster student success in these transformative times.

The report was completed by Dr. Jim Brandon, Director of Graduate Professional Programs at the Werklund School of Education at the University of Calgary, and Dr. Paulette Hanna, Program Coordinator for the Master of Education, Instructional Leadership Program at the University of Calgary and Director of Leadership Learning for the College of Alberta School Superintendents.




