MLA for Edmonton-Calder





David Eggen was sworn in as the Minister of Education and as the Minister of Culture and Tourism on May 24, 2015.

Mr. Eggen was elected as the Member of the Legislative Assembly for Edmonton-Calder on April 23, 2012 and again on May 5, 2015. He previously represented the constituency from 2004 to 2008 and served as the ND's critic for energy, education, environment and sustainable resource development.

Mr. Eggen was educated at the University of Alberta, where he received a bachelor of education degree in 1984. He then went to Zimbabwe, where he taught for three years. Upon his return to Edmonton he taught at a number of local schools from 1990 to 2004.

Mr. Eggen has served as a member of the following committees:

- Standing Committee on Families and Communities
- Standing Committee on Legislative Offices
- Standing Committee on Alberta's Economic Future
- Select Special Chief Electoral Officer Search Committee
- Select Special Ethics Commissioner Search Committee
- Standing Committee on the Alberta Heritage Savings Trust Fund

In addition to his contributions to education and health care, Mr. Eggen is a trustee with the Forum for Young Albertans and a chair leader of the Canadian Paraplegic Association.

# Mental Health Matters! Psychological issues and their effect on children's lives.



The mental health concerns of children and youth is emerging as an urgent problem in Canadian health and education systems. Mental health concerns in youth have been identified as the most pressing problem facing children and their families as the human, social and economic costs of the problem attract professional attention.

The Mental Health Commission of Canada has identified schools as a primary site for delivering and coordinating interventions. Educators play a key role in noticing how mental health issues can be a primary challenge for those students who are also struggling academically.

Lynn D. Miller, Ph. D., R. Psych., has retired from her position as Associate Professor in the Education and Counseling Psychology and Special Education department at UBC. She started her career as a classroom teacher, and then worked as a school counselor K-12.

She managed several research grants, including a Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) grant, examining the effects of empirically supported approaches to child anxiety in the public school system.

She was a consultant to the FRIENDS program, an evidence-based curriculum based on cognitive behaviour principles targeting anxiety, available to all grade 4-5 students in BC.

She has conducted research on other models of anxiety prevention programs in schools, including Taming Worry Dragons, Skills for Social and Academic Success, Cool Little Kids, as well as an enhanced program for Aboriginal children.

As the Myrne Nevison Prevention Research Professor, she investigated anxiety at the entry to school in grades kindergarten and one.

She is President of the Anxiety Disorders Association of Canada, 2010-2013, 2018-2019, and recently completed her term serving as the President of the International Association of Marriage and Family Counselors (2004-2006).

### Working Together to Support Mental Health in Alberta Schools (Government Resource)

This is a Government of Alberta resource to support processes for mental health planning in and with schools. Intended to help build a shared understanding of how schools, community partners and government can better work together, this resource is an invitation for schools and their partners to reflect on current practices, leverage current initiatives and consider how the promotion of mental health can be most effectively embedded in school and system policies, practices and services.

Krystal Abrahamowicz is a Designer of Professional Learning with the Calgary Regional Consortium. Previously, she spent over 13 years as a Teacher, Student Services Specialist, and then Student Services Coordinator at a Charter School in Calgary. Krystal is the author of the *Supporting High School Completion: A Tool Kit for Success* resource.

Bev Baker-Hofmann is an Education Manager with Alberta Education in the School and Community Supports Branch and works primarily within the area of mental health in schools. She is a Registered Psychologist and has extensive experience working in schools in a variety of roles including teacher, counsellor, consultant, and district office administrator.

# Sexting & Cyberbullying -Keeping Youth Safe Online Nimmi Kanii

TELUS WISE will share some key findings from two studies that provide insights for keeping youth safe online as it pertains to cyberbullying and sexting:

- 1. Motivations and dynamics of sexting among young people this research, conducted in 2017 in partnership with MediaSmarts, uncovers insights about the prevalence of, and attitudes towards sexting, and gender differences associated with this behaviour.
- 2. The Young Canadians' Experiences with Electronic Bullying study conducted in 2015, in partnership with MediaSmarts and PREVNet, this research is aimed at better understanding the relationship between peer intervention and electronic bullying among Canadian youth.

Nimmi Kanji is the Director for the TELUS WISE program at TELUS. The program has garnered over 3.5 million engagements by Canadians since its inception. Nimmi started her career at TELUS eighteen years ago while she was a student at the University of Calgary. After graduating with a Bachelor of Commerce in Marketing and a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology, and prior to leading TELUS WISE, she spent several years in TELUS Business Marketing.

Participants will explore their role in this shift and discuss how they are an essential component in this journey towards fostering an authentic and respectful relationship to this land, to its first peoples, and to each other.

Jessica Daniels is an Indigenous Consultant for the Edmonton Regional Learning Consortium. She is from Edmonton, and has studied political science and philosophy at the University of Alberta, as well as Business Administration at NAIT.

Jessica has been involved in Aboriginal women's organizations since 1990 when she was the youth representative on the Women of the Métis Nation Board, one of the first Métis women's groups to ever be established. She is the current president of the Aboriginal Women's Justice Foundation, an organization dedicated to policy and social change to improve outcomes for Aboriginal women.

The Alberta School Audit tool includes survey data to determine what is working well and identify areas for improvement. This session will provide the foundation and explain the "why" behind the creation of this audit tool and the journey SACSC has taken in support of Alberta schools.

Amber Hester is currently the Assistant Superintendent of Inclusive Learning Services with Wolf Creek Public Schools. # Alberta Education Provincial Assessment Update

Pascal Couture, Jenny Kim, Kelly Rota Alberta Education

Over the last year, several important Provincial Assessment updates have been made, or are underway, including:

- Providing parts of Grades 6 and 9
   Mathematics Provincial Achievement
   Tests (PATs) that students complete
   without using calculators;
- Working on providing written response questions for Mathematics 30-1 and 30-2 diploma exams, starting in the 2018-19 school year;
- Permitting all students to use up to twice the writing time to complete PATs and Diploma Exams, if needed;
- Providing teachers with the opportunity to administer Grade 3 Student Learning Assessments (SLAs) at their discretion;
- Providing school authorities with flexibility to administer PATs within a timeframe.

Learn how these updates are positively impacting students!

Pascal Couture is Senior Manager of Exam Administration and Production with the Provincial Assessment Sector of Alberta Education. He has worked in education in Alberta over the past 24 years, including teaching high school science in Edmonton.

# Student Attendance and Reengagement: *A New Approach*

He was the Director of the Alberta Initiative for School Improvement (AISI) at the University of Alberta from 2005-2009, and taught several graduate courses in the Master of Education in Educational Studies (MES) program.

Phil has worked in many secondary and post-secondary educational contexts while living and teaching in the Middle East (United Arab Emirates), Asia (Japan), Europe (Spain), and in Alberta, with the Lethbridge Public School District and on the indigenous Blood (Kainai Nation) Reserve.

# Anxiety Disorders in School Aged Children

Dr. Lynn Miller

Lynn D. Miller, Ph. D., Lic. Psych., (formerly) Faculty Emeritus, University of British Columbia

Anxiety disorders are the most common form of psychological distress reported by children and adolescents, and can interfere significantly in the lives of children.

An anxiety disorder is a level of anxiety that interferes with daily functioning, either with peer relationships, academic performance, or in family routines.

Children with anxiety disorders are shy, inhibited, and avoidant; helping personnel are typically very good at identifying anxiety in children but may not use the most effective interventions to support children and youth.

Lynn D. Miller, Ph. D., R. Psych., has retired from her position as Associate Professor in the Education and Counseling Psychology and Special Education department at UBC. She started her career as a classroom teacher, and then worked as a school counselor K-12.

She managed several research grants, including a Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) grant, examining the effects of child anxiety in the public school system.

She has conducted research on other models of anxiety prevention programs in schools, including Taming Worry Dragons, Skills for Social and Academic Success, Cool Little Kids, as well as an enhanced program for Aboriginal children.

She is President of the Anxiety Disorders Assoc. of Canada, 2010-2013, 2018-2019, and recently completed her term serving as the President of the International Association of Marriage and Family Counselors (2004-2006).

# Abuse and the School's Role Keeping Kids Safe

There are students in every school who are experiencing abuse.

Prolonged exposure to traumatic events, such as abuse or neglect, can negatively impact the developing brain.

Although it may be uncomfortable to talk about, school staff must be prepared to respond when a child or youth reaches out for help as this is a critical first step on their journey to safety and well-being.

This session will provide an opportunity to view and discuss, A School's Role in Keeping our Kids Safe, developed to support school staff to know what signs to look for, how to ask questions if needed and what to expect when reporting suspected child abuse.

Kim is on secondment to the Sheldon Kennedy Child Advocacy Centre (SKCAC) from the Calgary Board of Education.

Kim has enjoyed many teaching and leadership positions at the school, system and provincial level and is honored to serve as the SKCAC Education Coordinator.

In this role, Kim works collaboratively with SKCAC staff, schools, and other educational stakeholders to build the capacity of educators to recognize and respond to suspected child abuse and use trauma-informed practices to create safe, supportive learning environments.

She is particularly inspired by her work with the Youth Champion Initiative to engage high school students in leading actions to contribute to a culture of support and wellbeing within their school community.

Cannabis Use and School
Children: What Will Change
After Legislation?

On April 13, 2017, the Government of Canada introduced legislation to legalize, regulate and restrict access to cannabis.

This legislation is expected to come into effect by July 2018.

Cannabis is currently an illegal substance (with the exception of authorized medical use) under the federal Controlled Drugs and Substances Act.

Many Canadians have questions about how these plans will affect their children and school, and whether we are ready for cannabis legalization.

As a Medical Officer of Health and a Public Health physician, Dr. Mosli will cover the public health approach to substances, and what to expect will change after legalization.

Dr. Mosli is a Medical Officer of Health for the Alberta Health Services Central Zone, working out of Red Deer.

His areas of interest include Health Promotion, Environmental Public Health, School Health, and Quality Improvement in Public Health.




